APPOINTMENTS

9:05 a.m. - Lorraine Graham and Carol VanMoerkerke - Dereham Centre Hall - 2021 Grant Request

Lorraine Graham and Carol VanMoerkerke presented Council with the 2021 grant request from the Dereham Centre Hall Board. They advised that they are assuming that the hall will not be rented very much during the first half of 2021 due to ongoing gathering restrictions. They are hoping to proceed with a fundraising event in June, 2021. They reviewed their anticipated expenses for 2021 and the proposed capital budget for the next five years for Council. Due to the anticipated reduced rentals in 2021, the hall board would like to proceed with kitchen renovations this year. This will include the installation of a dishwasher to support the Township's transition to zero waste.

Mrs. Graham commented on an issue that they are experiencing with their hydro costs at the facility. There was a large jump in the usage and bill for August/September. Chief Building Official Howard Leaver will follow up with EARTH to see if they can determine where the issue is.

The Committee would also like to consider the development of a pavilion at the hall in 2023. They think that this would be a nice addition to the Dereham Centre park and will be nice for families to book for picnics. The windows in the hall are also going to need to be replaced. They would also like to consider applying for a Trillium Grant in 2022 for some playground equipment at the park.

9:45 a.m. - Trevor Finkenzeller - Salford Hall - 2021 Grant Request

Trevor Finkenzeller addressed Council regarding the 2021 grant request for the Salford Hall. He advised that the committee is in the middle of upgrading the senior's room at the hall. They are anticipating another difficult year with few rentals in 2021 due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. He noted that the holiday season is particularly difficult because this is the time of the year when the hall would normally have the bulk of their rentals. He stated that the Committee is hopeful that gatherings may be permitted for Thanksgiving and Christmas next year.

The Committee held a fundraiser on October 28th which netted over \$2,000. Mr. Finkenzeller commented on the positive community support for the hall. The Committee is planning to do another couple of drive thru fundraisers if they can get enough volunteer support.

Mr. Finkenzeller also reviewed the Committee's five-year capital plan. The Committee would like to have the lines painted in the hall parking lot and do some repairs to drywall and paint in the small room of the community centre. They would also like to revamp the outside concession stand – this structure is in need of new siding; this project is scheduled for 2022. Air conditioning and roof repairs will be needed the following year. It is anticipated that there will be additional costs for the roof repairs due to the solar panels on the roof.

10:00 a.m. - Barb Freeman - Mt. Elgin Cemetery - 2021 Grant Request

Scott Paton reviewed the 2021 grant request from the Mt. Elgin Cemetery Board. He reviewed the budget for the past year and advised that the cemetery had two regular burials and one cremation this past year. He noted that the board received less fundraising revenue in 2020.

In response to an inquiry from Councillor Pickard, Mr. Paton advised that the annual grass cutting costs for the cemetery were \$6,000. Council discussed the charge for plots at the cemetery; it is \$1,800 for a double plot and \$500 for a cremation plot. A regular grave opening is \$850 and the cost to open for a cremation is \$350. Council questioned if the board has any interest in purchasing a columbarium for the cemetery. Barb Freeman stated that the cemetery board doesn't have enough funds for a columbarium. The columbarium that was installed in Sweaburg was \$11,000 for 24 niches.

STAFF REPORTS

BD 15-2020: Furnace and boiler replacement Foldens and Brownsville Hall

Chief Building Official Howard Leaver provided Council with a report to provide them with an update on the status of the failing furnace at Foldens Hall and the failing boiler at Brownsville Fire Hall. He advised that three companies have looked at the issues and provided three quotes. The furnace at the Foldens Hall is now installed and operating with an Ecobee thermostat.

With respect to the Brownsville fire hall and community centre, he is still waiting for parts for the boiler and a third quote for the repair of the rooftop unit.

AND FURTHER THAT the cost of the Foldens Hall furnace replacement estimated at \$3,886.00 (plus applicable tax) be divided with 25% of the cost being covered by the Foldens Hall Committee and the remaining 75% of the cost be paid with funds from the Township Recreation Reserve.

BD 16-2020: Monthly Building Report - October 2020

Chief Building Official Howard Leaver provided a report to Council to provide them with the status of the activities in the building department as of the end of October, 2020. He advised that October was another busy month, and that the Township will exceed their anticipated building permit revenue for the year.

CL 48-2020: Operation of Off-Road Vehicles on Highway (O. Reg 316/03)

Clerk Julie Forth provided Council with a report to bring forward an amendment to O. Reg 316/03 regarding the operation of off-road vehicles on municipal roads for Council's information and consideration. She explained that the legislative changes shift the onus of the municipality from allowing off-road vehicles on Township roads to prohibiting off-road vehicles on Township roads. If the Township does not pass a by-law to prohibit their use, they will be permitted as of January 1st, 2020.

Members of Council expressed concern with passing a by-law to prohibit the use of off-road vehicles on Township roads because they are often used by farmers travelling from farm to farm. This provides them with a more affordable vehicle for travel and also results in a reduction in greenhouse gas. There is concern that if the vehicles are not permitted on Township roads that people will use agricultural fields to travel through and take short cuts. Councillor Gillis expressed his support for prohibiting off-road vehicles on Township sidewalks and parks. However, he commented that young farm staff often use these vehicles to travel to and from work. Council commented that the proposed by-law is very restrictive and that if people are using off-road vehicles safety and within the requirements of the regulation, then they shouldn't be prohibited.

Councillor Pickard expressed concerns with the use of off-road vehicles within Sweaburg, and commented on the vehicles being operated by drivers without a driver's licence. He stated that he would support a by-law that prohibits their use within residential zones.

Mayor Mayberry expressed support for the by-law and commented on the liability and risk to the Township should the municipality allow the use of off-road vehicles on Township roads. If they are permitted on Township roads, the Township may be liable should an incident or collision occur.

CL 49-2020: Petition for Drainage Works (Dereham Line/Daniel Road)

Clerk Julie Forth provided Council with a report to bring forward a Petition for Drainage Works, submitted by Township of South-West Oxford Works Superintendent Adam Prouse, for property in the vicinity of Dereham Line and

Daniel Road and Petition for Drainage Works submitted by property owners on Daniel Road and Mt. Elgin Road.

TR 20-2020: 2021 Budget Amendments

Treasurer Diane Larder provided Council with a report to provide them with information as to how the funds received from the Town of Ingersoll and the City of Woodstock as a result of recent boundary adjustment agreements will impact the 2021 and future municipal budgets.

She advised that the 2021 budget will include funds received "from other municipalities" in the amount of \$564,506. These funds will be collected each year from the City of Woodstock and the Town of Ingersoll in perpetuity; adjusted annually by CPI as outlined in each agreement. These funds represent former tax dollars that the Township would have received if the properties remained located within the boundaries of South-West Oxford. When the properties were transferred out of the boundaries of South-West Oxford and into the two adjoining municipalities, the Township's assessment base will decrease accordingly. As the assessment base is decreased there will be an offsetting revenue of "other municipal" funds to prevent an increase in the tax levy for the properties that remain in South-West Oxford. Treasurer Larder advised that these funds were purposely excluded from the draft budget because they will impact the levy requirement and weighted assessment.

Staff are requesting to include in the 2021 budget a transfer from the Tax Stabilization Reserve in the amount of \$37,399 to help fund the difference in
